- **Official statements, guidelines and other documents published by the Board related to the practice of pharmacy in this province.**

This is a closed-book examination.

For the multiple choice, true/false, fill in blank grid/questions, there is only one correct answer although more than one answer may be correct in certain circumstances.

Pharmacy jurisprudence competencies (NAPRA)

1. Pharmacists apply legal requirements and ethical principles, together with professional policies and standards concerning patient care
2. Pharmacists apply legal requirements and ethical principles affecting the acquisition, storage, distribution, promotion and disposal of drugs and devices
 - i. Acquisition of drugs and devices
 - ii. Storage of drugs, devices and related information
 - iii. Distribution of drugs and devices
 - iv. Promotion of drugs and devices
 - v. Disposal of drugs and devices
3. Pharmacists can elucidate the complaints and discipline processes and consequences for pharmacists and non-pharmacists
4. Pharmacists can specify the requirements for obtaining, maintaining and reactivating a license to practice as a pharmacist
5. Pharmacists can explain the requirements for owning and managing a pharmacy
6. Pharmacists can explain the Code of Ethics
7. Pharmacists can demonstrate basic knowledge of the legal requirements for manufacturers of drugs and devices
8. Pharmacists exercise professional judgement in ethical and legal decision-making
9. Pharmacists can explain the meaning of fundamental legal terms which are relevant to pharmacy
 - i. Identify and define fundamental legal terms eg drug
 - ii. Explain the relevance of the legal terms to the practice of pharmacy
10. Pharmacists can describe the role, structure, function and mandate of the provincial regulatory authority
 - i. Define regulatory authority
 - ii. Describe the role and function of the administration, management and governance of the provincial regulatory authority
 - iii. Distinguish among by-laws, rules, policies, guidelines and regulations
 - iv. Discuss other professional acts and how other health professions are regulated
 - v. Discuss scope of practice, authorized acts and protected titles
 - vi. Compare the public interest role with that of advocacy
